Qatar Museums' journey started in 2006, with a 25-year plan focused on human development. Our investment in the local community led to significant achievements. The first phase of that strategy is in full operation, focusing on heritage and identity, with the Museum of Islamic Art, Mathaf: Arab Museum of Modern Art, and the National Museum of Qatar — with important exhibitions on heritage, Arab identity, contemporary life and sustainability.

The second phase of our strategy focused on social development. With the recent opening of the 3-2-1 Qatar Olympic and Sports Museum, that speaks not only about international sports, but also Qatari' local and traditional sports, and sports around the world. The DADU Children's Museum recently celebrated the opening of its gardens with programs on food security, agriculture and sustainability at the heart of our offerings. Its target opening date is 2026.



The last phase of the 25-year plan focuses on global outreach and world connections, and that will be implemented through the Qatar Auto museum, the Lusial Museum and the Art Mill Museum.

Engaging segments of our community is at the core of what we do — with various committees from our academic, teachers, teenage and collectors council. These dynamic relationships between communities and museums ensures more representation for the future needs of generations.

A cultural activist in the Arab world, addressing photography, archives, and modern and contemporary art, Arida reopened the Sursock Museum in Beirut after a ten-year renovation and expansion project, initiating local and international partnerships, presenting exhibitions, public programs, and library and archives activities, turning the museum into a local and international landmark. Following the damage caused by the Beirut blast on August 4, 2020, she raised 2.5 million dollars for the reconstruction of the building and the restoration of the artwork. From 1997 to 2014, she was the director of the Arab Image Foundation (AIF).

Arida provides expertise to international private and public institutions as well as consultation to arts and culture organizations, artists, and projects. She is currently a member of the Advisory Board of Darat al Funun, Amman, a member of the Arab Image Foundation, Beirut, and a member of the Scientific Committee of the Art Mill Museum in Doha.

#### **INTERCOM Doha 2023 Conference**





The 3 day conference hosted by ICOM Qatar and organized by ICOM-INTERCOM in partnership with Qatar Museums, and in collaboration with CIMAM, ICOM SEE and ICOM Croatia, took place at the National Museum of Qatar in Doha, Qatar, from 6th until 9th of May 2023. The conference hosted at Doha welcomed more than 185 participants from across the globe.

**INTERCOM Doha 2023** builds on the results of a large-scale museum leadership survey that ICOM – INTERCOM undertook in 2021 to explore how global crises have impacted leaders and decision makers in their everyday work. The research establishes the context in which museum leaders are operating. It highlights the crucial importance of visionary leadership for museums to develop suitable strategies to overcome the consequences of multiple crises and to establish trust and open dialogue between stakeholders – a key issue for any leader.

The conference was structured in three main themes, all related to visionary museum leadership:

- 1. The museum leader profile, key skills, and essential mindset of the leader.
- 2. Visions for the future based on a cross-cultural exchange of knowledge and experiences.
- 3. Museum governance.



#### Reception

#### 6th of May 2023:

To inaugurate the start of the INTERCOM Doha 2023 Conference, a reception was held at Al Jiwan Restaurant at the National Museum of Qatar where the Doha organizing committee was honored to invite its distinguished guests and international delegates. Following the reception, a dinner was held and attended by 125 people from different prestigious organizations.



#### Day One

#### 7th of May 2023:

The conference was inaugurated by Her Excellency Sheikha Al Mayassa bint Hamad bin Khalifa Al Thani – the chairperson of Qatar Museums and was attended by various elite individuals from all across the globe. During the opening, Chair of Intercom ICOM Dr. Goranka Hojan and Director of Morocco Telecommunication Museum in Rabat and Chair of ICOM Arab Dr. Ech-Cherki Dahmali shared some inspirational words. After the opening, Sheikha Maryam Ali Al Thani from Qatar Museums and M. Cristina Vannini INTERCOM Secretary facilitated the conference.







The first day of INTERCOM Doha included sessions I and II where the participants presented their research to the audience of the conference. Each session included a keynote speaker: Prof. Dr. Vlatka Ariaana Hlupič – Professor of Leadership and Management at Hult International Business School, and Prof. Dr. Pier Luigi Sacco – Professor of Economics at University of Chieti-Pescara, Senior Adviser to the OECD, Paris, Research Affiliate at the metaLAB at Harvard.

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Towards the end of the day, the participants enjoyed a guided tour to different museums in Qatar provided by the hosting committee.



#### **Day Two**

#### 8th of May 2023:

During day two of the conference INTERCOM Board member Ms.Anne-Marie Gilis moderated session III where participants continued to present their research and Prof. Dr. Desmond Hui, Professor and Head of Department of Art and Design at The Hang Seng University of Hong Kong, gave the keynote speech of this session.

The second half of the day was dedicated to the participants' poster session and workshops. The poster session allowed the participants to share their posters with the audience members at the National Museum Library. INTERCOM Doha held four different workshops that took place simultaneously which allowed participants to share knowledge and experience.

#### **Day Three**

#### 9th of May 2023:

The last day of INTERCOM Doha was dedicated to a series of four round tables that covered the main themes of the conference which provided a platform for an open discussion between the panelists and the audience members.

#### **Round Table 1**

The theme of the first roundtable session was "Museums leadership across Mena". It was moderated by Zeina Arida, the director of Mathaf: Arab Museum of Modern Art. The panelists included Francesca Bacci Associate Professor of Art History and Museum Studies at Zayed University Abu Dhabi, Maha Al Shebani, a coordinator of international research development at Qatar Museums and Abdulrahman Alrogaiey, an architectural Engineer at Sayl for cultural architecture.

Their discussion was mainly about how museums can stay relevant to their contemporary time while maintaining their main mission of preserving tangible and intangible heritage of humanity. Parts of the session focused on how museums and cultural institutions can stay relevant by using the power of social media to connect and involve youth in their activities. A great example to this discussion was Sheikha Al Mayassa Instagram account. Lastly, they discussed the architecture of the museums and how it can contribute to the fruition of the institution.

#### Zeina Arida – Director of Mathaf: Arab Museum of Modern Art commented:

"The roundtable I moderated was the occasion of engaging in inspiring conversations around the Museum of the future and its governance, looking at alternative museum models that are challenging the older museums model and positioning audience engagement and storytelling at the core of the museum"

#### Round Table 2

The theme of the second round table was "Museums and Society". It was moderated by the Director of Public Art at Qatar Museums Mr. Abdulrahman Al Ishaq. The panelists included Sheikha Najla Al Thani – (National Museum of Qatar), Dr. Nour Allah Munawar – (Doha Institute of Graduate Studies), Dr. Amr Al Azm – (Qatar University), Dr Imed Ben Salah – (University of Tunis).

The roundtable's discussion of "Museums and Society" touched on how society and cultural institutions interact. The roundtable discussion included a variety of topics, including how members of the society felt about new cultural institutions and if these new additions fit with the community's traditions and beliefs. Museums in societies that are in areas of ongoing conflict and how to rebuild a connection between the people of the society and these institutions were additional topics that were covered.


#### Abdulrahman Al Ishaq – Director of Public Art at Qatar Museums commented:

"Cultural institutions are seen as custodians of heritage and culture. However, the responsibility is shared with the public whom by claiming ownership insure the cultural relevance of the institutions. By engaging in cultural discourse and attending the institutes activities, the public expresses ownership and influence their direction."

#### **Round Table 3**

The third session was dedicated to the theme "Museum Audience & Cultural Leadership" moderated by Ms. Martha Ikabongo – INTERCOM Board Member. The panelists included: Sirine Abdelhedi – Embassy of the State of Qatar Paris, Jenny Brown – Qatar Museums, Allegra Burnette – Qatar Museums, Rania Sawalhi – Dadu Children Museum of Qatar, Clara Chien Hui Liam – Dadu Children Museum of Qatar, Asma Hasan – Dadu Children Museum of Qatar.

Participants discussed initiatives taken by museum leaderships to meet the requirements of museum audiences and visitors based on the research that they carry out, as well as how museum leaders play a very significant role in reaching the audience and making museums in the area more welcoming. Members of DADU Children Museum of Qatar demonstrated the museum's emphasis on child development and how it centers around providing children the ideal atmosphere and opportunity to start developing their leadership abilities early on.









#### Ms. Martha Ikabongo – INTERCOM Board Member commented:

"In the third roundtable Visions for the Future Museum from the Arab World were discussed. The picture that emerged was the need to implement art programs and trainings to open opportunities for museum leaders to develop new audiences. With the same aim, early age new educational programs and activities are developed both to increase digital products and to preserve culture and heritage through interactive approaches and activities."

#### **Round Table 4**

This session was dedicated to the theme "New Museums & New Ideas" moderated by Ms. Lizzy Moriarty – INTERCOM Workshop's Leader. The panelists included: Shaikha Nasser Al Nassr – (Qatar Museums), Tara Desjardins – (Qatar Museums), Marta Oliveira – Oman Across Ages Museum, Jawaher Al Kuwari – (Qatar Museums).

The discussion of the theme covered areas of how new museums aim to have a more engaged visitor experience and more involvement of youth perspectives. Part of the session focused on capacity building and how important it is for museum staff to be a core aspect of new museums and their involvement as part of the early-stage planning. Furthermore, the topic of museum leaders investing in technology and innovation to develop museums was discussed and studies on Qatar Museums has proven the effective use of innovation is museums such as the National Museum of Qatar. To finish off the session, an interactive question and answers segment with the audience took place.

"The fourth round-table, new museums and new ideas, gave the audience a chance to appreciate the approaches used in the construction of Oman Across Ages Museum (Marta Oliveira and Al Yaqdhan Al Harthi) and in the Relaunch project of the Museum of Islamic Art, Doha (Shaika Nasser Al-Nassr and Tara Desjardins). They consist of capacity building training and participatory consultations for a better and more exhaustive museum experience, especially for families and young audiences. While knowledge sharing among all the stakeholder is important to provide understandable and enjoyable museum contents to families and young audiences, this cannot be achieved without the curatorial responsibility in guiding the interpretation of the collections and the use of the most innovative digital technologies, as at the National Museum Qatar (NMQ) in the presentation of J. Alkuwari, to organize, preserve and communicate Cultural Heritage."





#### **Closing Day**

To wrap up the INTERCOM Doha 2023 conference, the participants enjoyed a closing lunch and ended their three days of knowledge and experience exchange with the last guided tour to different museums in Qatar provided by the Doha organizing committee which provided a true culture enriching experience for everyone.


